





Stonehenge and Avebury have a powerful magnetism that has drawn people to them down the centuries. Two megalithic stone circles, within one outstanding World Heritage Site. Steeped in history, they stand testament to the ages. Visit this year to experience their magic for yourself.

The ancient Britons attached great significance to **Stonehenge**. Among its many unique features is its orientation on the rising and setting sun.
