



Where you can choose eco-friendly travel and transport. Whether you are travelling by car, coach, train, air or sea, Wiltshire is easily accessible. Buses or trains can bring you directly into towns and villages like Salisbury, Westbury, Chippenham and Pewsey. And once you've arrived, there are many organisations that run bus tours to local attractions like Stonehenge and Avebury. Wiltshire is largely rural and almost half of the county is designated as an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty, so you can also be sure to find lots of options for exploring the gorgeous countryside and quaint English villages by foot or by bike. 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

Salisbury is a city of ageless beauty and captivating history, where medieval magnificence meets contemporary culture.

At its heart is Salisbury Cathedral, a hundreds of years. Gathered around it is an inspiring city, alive with fascinating people, places and experiences. Salisbury's story reaches back through the centuries and the city is proud of his rich heritage. Yet it is no stranger to



another, from the tallest spire in Britain and the world's oldest working clock, to the finest original 1215 Magna Carta manuscript. Other attractions within the Cathedral Close include The Salisbury Museum, Mompesson House and The Rifles Berkshire & Wiltshire Museum. Nearby is the Parish Church of St Thomas, with its magnificent Doom Painting. On the outskirts of the city you'll find both Old Sarum, the original site of Salisbury, and River Bourne Community Farm. Boscombe Down Aviation Collection, Salisbury Racecourse and Stonehenge are on the doorstep too.

In the historic heart of the city, you'll find an excellent range of unique, independent retailers as well as high street stores and regular markets. Tempting tearooms and coffee shops abound, together with cosy pubs, riverside inns and friendly restaurants. Complementing the exciting yearround programme of festivals and events, Wiltshire Creative - combining Salisbury Playhouse, Salisbury Arts Centre and Salisbury International Arts Festival - provide a fabulous annual programme of arts and entertainment.

Just 90 minutes by train from London Waterloo, Salisbury makes an unbeatable destination for day trips and short breaks alike. TIMELESS WONDERS


Stonehenge and Avebury have a powerful magnetism that has drawn people to them down the centuries. Two megalithic stone circles, within one outstanding World Heritage Site. Steeped in history, they stand testament to the ages. Visit this year to experience their magic for yourself.

The ancient Britons attached great significance to **Stonehenge**. Among its many unique features is its orientation on the rising and setting sun. Why it was built in this way remains a mystery to this day, but if you stand on Salisbury Plain at sunrise or sunset, it's easy to understand why people from around the globe continue to pay homage to this magnificent

Arrive at **Avebury** as dawn breaks over the **North Wessex Downs** and you'll instantly appreciate the appeal this sacred place held for our ancestors. A massive outer bank and ditch surround the world's largest stone circle. Which, in turn, encloses two smaller stone circles and part of


Within the wider landscape lie further ancient structures including West Kennet Long Barrow, one of Britain's largest Stone Age burial sites, and the massive man-made mound of **Silbury Hill**. Look out for Wiltshire's distinctive White Horses, too, carved into the rolling chalk downs. Of the original thirteen, eight can still be seen today, standing watch over the

Around a quarter of the Great West Way runs through Wiltshire. Along paths that once brought drovers to market. Pilgrims to Salisbury Cathedral. Druids to Avebury and Stonehenge. Across rolling hills in the North Wessex Downs. Past white horse carvings keeping watch over the Vale of Pewsey. Timeless towns and villages along the route

include honey-coloured Bradford on Avon. The 'discovery' town of Calne. Chippenham, on the banks of the River Avon. Corsham, familiar as Truro from BBC's Poldark. A small market town that has Stonehenge (2 miles) and in nearby Durrington you will find Woodhenge (1.5 miles), all within its Parish. Historic Amesbury is an attractive town sitting on the River Avon, now known to be the oldest continuous living settlement in this country,

In 2023 a new History Centre, complete with café and shop opened, housing one of Britain's largest Mesolithic collections, it tells an amazing story, along with much more about Amesbury's History. Amesbury has hotels, bed and breakfasts, independent shops, restaurants and inns -the town is a great stopping point for travellers and visitors to Stonehenge and south Wiltshire. There is affordable parking with two coach spaces in the central car park.

Stonehenge is of course the closest attraction to Amesbury and the 2 mile walk across the historic landscapeis both invigorating and interesting. Just to the north is Woodhenge - a neolithic site which was first recognised through aerial photogrataken in 1925, it is an equally interesting site to visit. Closer to the town is Lords Walk which offers the combination of a unique view of the River Avon, as well as a walk along the old Lime

St Mary and St Melor is a unique experience. Housed within is a 15th entury clock that is believed to have




