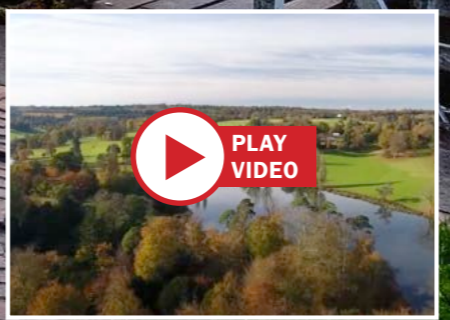

Salisbury Cathedral offers one superlative after another, from the tallest spire in Britain and the world's oldest walking clock, to the finest original 1315 Magna Carta manuscript. Other attractions within the Cathedral Close include The Salisbury Museum, Mompesson House and The Rifles Berkshire & Wiltshire Museum. Nearby is the Parish Church of St Thomas, with its magnificent Doom Painting. On the outskirts of the city you'll find both Old Sarum, the original site of Salisbury, and River Bourne Community Farm, Boscombe Down, Aviation Collection, Salisbury Racecourse and Stonehenge are on the doorstep too.

In the historic heart of the city, you'll find an excellent range of unique, independent retailers as well as high street stores and regular markets. Tempting tearooms and coffee shops abound, together with cosy pubs, riverside inns and friendly restaurants. Complementing the exciting year-round programme of festivals and events, Wiltshire Creative - combining Salisbury Playhouse, Salisbury Arts Centre and Salisbury International Arts Festival - provide a fabulous annual programme of arts and entertainment.

TIMELESS WONDERS

Stonehenge and Avebury have a powerful magnetism that has drawn people to them down the centuries. Two megalithic stone circles, within one outstanding World Heritage Site. Steeped in history, they stand testament to the ages. Visit this year to experience their magic for yourself.

The ancient Britons attached great significance to Stonehenge. Among its many unique features is its orientation on the rising and setting sun. Why it was built in this way remains a mystery to this day, but if you stand on Salisbury Plain at sunrise or sunset, it's easy to understand why people from around the globe continue to pay homage to this magnificent site.

Arrive at Avebury as dawn breaks over the North Wessex Downs and you'll instantly appreciate the appeal this sacred place held for our ancestors. A massive outer bank and ditch surround the world's largest stone circle. Which, in turn, encloses two smaller stone circles and part of the village.

Within the wider landscape lie further ancient structures including West Kennet Long Barrow, one of Britain's largest Stone Age burial sites, and the massive man-made mound of Silbury Hill. Look out for Wiltshire's distinctive White Horses, too, carved into the rolling chalk downs. Of the original thirteen, eight can still be seen today, standing watch over the countryside.

Wiltshire has been a special place for a very long time. Nowhere else in England will you find such a concentration of fascinating ancient sites. For thousands of years travellers have been seduced by their grandeur and majesty, and still they inspire a sense of wonder in visitors today.

AMESBURY

A small market town that has Stonehenge (2 miles) and in nearby Durrington you will find Woodhenge (1.5 miles), all within the Parish. Historic Amesbury is an attractive town sitting on the River Avon, now known to be the oldest continuous living settlement in this country, dating back over 6500 years BC.

In 2023 a new History Centre, complete with cafe and shop opened, housing one of Britain's largest Mesolithic collections. It tells an amazing story, along with much more about Amesbury's history. Amesbury has hotels, bed and breakfasts, independent shops, restaurants and from the town is a great starting point for travellers and visitors to Stonehenge and south Wiltshire. There is affordable parking with two coach spaces in the central car park.

Stonehenge is of course the closest attraction to Amesbury and the 2 mile walk across the historic landscapes both invigorating and interesting. Just to the north is Woodhenge – a neolithic site which was first recognised through aerial photography taken in 1925. It is an equally interesting site to visit.

Closer to the town is the oldest abbey in the country, the 12th century church of St Mary and St Martin is a unique experience. Housed within it is a 15th century clock that is believed to have been built for the Benedictine Abbey.

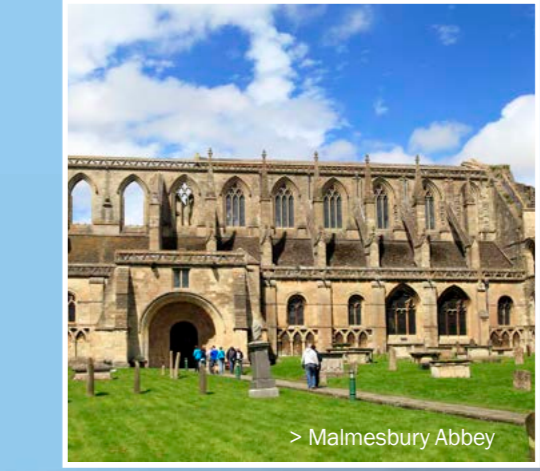

The First Town on the Thames. An ancient Saxon town on the edge of the Cotswolds, with over 250 listed buildings, an important site from the time of Alfred the Great. From 978 to 1300 the town had its own mint and a few coins can be seen in the Cricklade Museum. Cricklade, granted a charter in 1355, has a Memorial Court with a High Sheriff, a Town Crier and other historical posts.

For people who enjoy nature, North Meadow is a 'National Nature Reserve', and in April the rare Shakespearean Frithillies can be seen. Bishill Farm (originally a Secret World war site) is now a nature reserve managed by Wiltshire Wildlife Trust, and of course the famous Thames Path meanders through the town.

A range of facilities on the historic High Street offer interest and a welcome to visitors.
