The perfect historic city

In Salisbury, medieval magnificence meets contemporary culture, making it the ideal place to connect with the past whilst enjoying the present.

With its slender spire soaring gracefully into the sky, **Salisbury Cathedral** is the city's most iconic landmark. Among its many outstanding features are the tallest spire in Britain (123m/404ft), Britain's largest cathedral close and cloisters, and the world's oldest working clock. The glorious Chapter House makes a fitting setting for an exhibition showcasing the finest of only four original 1215 **Magna Carta** manuscripts.

The 80 acres of the Cathedral Close are an oasis of calm. Heavy wooden gates, still locked at 11pm every evening, are the only way in, and as you venture over the threshold it's as if you are stepping back in time. The Cathedral is not the only attraction to be found here. You can also explore fascinating galleries in **The Salisbury Museum**, home to nationally important treasures including finds from Stonehenge, the grave of the Amesbury Archer, and

the Monks' Deverill Gold Torc. Relive scenes from *Sense and Sensibility* at **Mompesson House**, a perfect Queen Anne residence in the care of the National Trust. Browse fascinating collections of art and memorabilia at **Arundells**, former home of Sir Edward Heath. Or delve into the history of two renowned local regiments at **The Rifles Berkshire & Wiltshire Museum**.

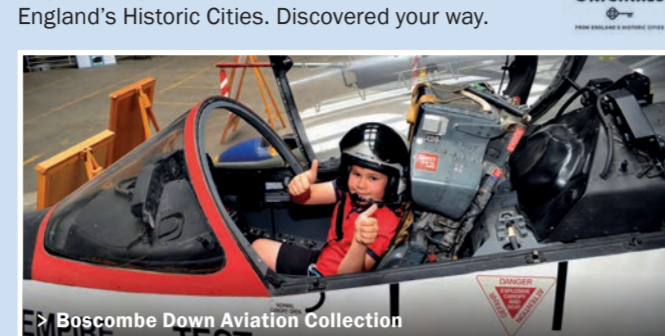
Leaving the Close by the High Street Gate, a short walk brings you to the **Parish Church of St Thomas**, where you can admire the country's largest and most complete 'Doom' painting. **Fisherton Mill** combines galleries and artist studios with a very popular café. On the northern outskirts of the city lies **Old Sarum**, originally an Iron Age hillfort, later inhabited by Romans, Saxons and Normans, before growing into a flourishing medieval settlement and the original site of Salisbury. A short drive away, **Boscombe Down Aviation Collection** is a working museum, housed in a World War One aircraft hangar. While **River Bourne Community Farm** in Laverstock, just 20 minutes' walk from the city centre, has lots of animals to see, water-meadow views, a farm shop and café.

Within the historic heart of the city you'll find excellent shopping opportunities, outstanding arts and entertainment, and a great range of places to eat and drink. There are ample activities to enjoy, too, both within the city itself and the surrounding area, and a wide range of accommodation to choose from.

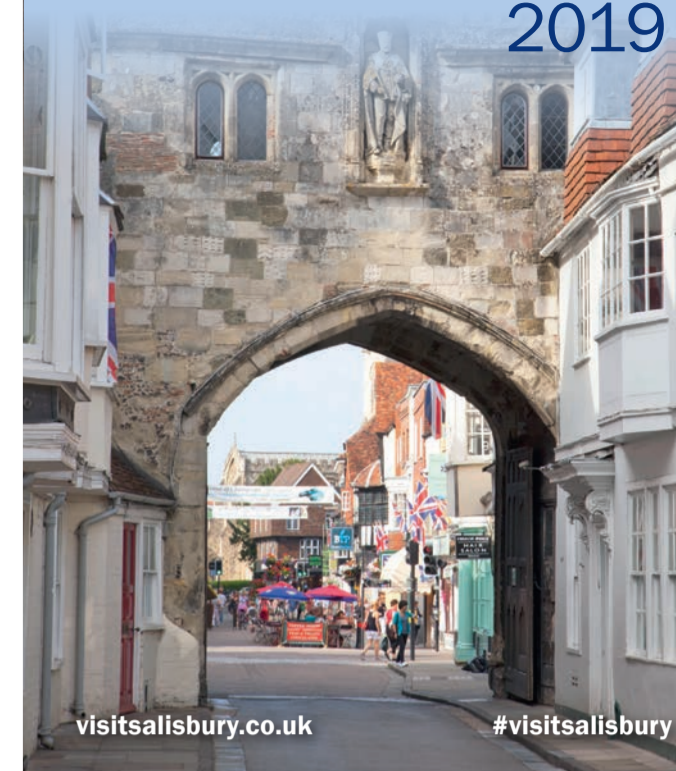

In 2018, Salisbury Playhouse, Salisbury Arts Centre and Salisbury International Arts Festival joined forces under the banner of Wiltshire Creative. The result is an exciting new organisation covering a broad spectrum of the arts. Add to this the three seasons of live performances on offer at City Hall, as well as exhibitions, concerts and other events at attractions including Salisbury Cathedral, Mompesson House and The Salisbury Museum, and you have a huge variety of entertainment to choose from, right throughout the year.
In and around the city you can enjoy drama, dance and musical theatre. Orchestras, choirs and bands. There are cuckoo and craft fairs. Talks and tours. History and food & drink festivals. Entertainment for adults and children. Indoors and out.
Salisbury International Arts Festival makes a welcome return for 2019, with two fabulous weeks of entertainment from 24 May-9 June. From 28-30 June the city is hosting Armed Forces Day National Event 2019 Salisbury - a spectacular three-day event, recognising and celebrating our armed forces in Wiltshire and throughout the UK. GETTING HERE IS EASY

Today life is hectic. Too hectic. 24/7 this. 4G that. Sometimes you just need to press pause and let time stand still. So come to Salisbury. Take things at a gentler pace. You'll be here in no time.

Fast, direct trains link Salisbury with London Waterloo in just 90 minutes. There are also direct services from Exeter, Tisbury, Basingstoke and Andover, as well as Cardiff, Bath, Southampton, Bristol and Portsmouth.

If you are travelling by car, Salisbury is approximately 90 minutes' drive from London, an hour from Bath, and around 50 minutes from the Channel ports of Portsmouth, Poole and Southampton. With five Park & Ride sites around the city, open six days per week, it's easy to park once you arrive.

PLENTY TO WHET YOUR APPETITE

Whether you choose to while away the hours over a long slow lunch, or grab a snack on the go, eating out is one of the many pleasures to be enjoyed on a visit to Salisbury.

The Haunch of Venison is reputedly the oldest (and most haunted) of the city's historic inns. Admire its rare, pewter-topped bar, then sneak a peek at the former bread oven (allegedly) containing the mummified hand of an 18th century card sharp. Nearby you can enjoy real ale and olde-worldie charm at Deacons and the Ox Row Inn. Sample craft beer and brunch-inspired favourites at The Old Ale and Coffee House. Or be captivated by views of the Cathedral as you stroll across water-meadows to The Old Mill at Harnham.

The Gallery Café at Fisherton Mill offers a generous helping of foodie heaven. Britford Farm Shop specialises in exquisite ice creams, cakes and patisserie. Restaurants with stunning views of the spire include The Refectory at Salisbury Cathedral and The River's Edge at the Rose & Crown Hotel. The Cathedral Hotel serves freshly-prepared food throughout the day. While the White Hart Hotel makes a traditional setting for morning coffee and afternoon tea, as well as lunch and dinner.

For Italian specialities head to Grillado, or the Milano restaurant at Milford Hall Hotel. Anokaa for contemporary Indian dishes. Baroshka for Middle Eastern and Moroccan cuisine. Côte Brasserie for French-inspired favourites. Tinga for a Mexican dining experience. Or the Rai d'Or for Thai food and real ale. You can slip seamlessly through the day from breakfast to dinner at Bill's. Try out one of the Cosy Club's enticing special offers. Then round the night off at The Chapel nightclub or The Vestry bar.

Within its original 'chequered' layout - formed by a series of parallel streets running north/south and east/west - it features a wealth of architectural styles from the 13th century to the present day.

Thanks to the city's origins in medieval times, many of its shops are housed in half-timbered buildings dating back hundreds of years. Along with the 14th century Poultry Cross, historic street names such as Butcher Row, Fish Row and Ox Row provide clues to the trades that were plied here in centuries past.

These days, shopping in Salisbury is a relaxed and unhurried experience. As you'd expect, there are modern shopping centres and many of your favourite high street stores. In addition, the city is renowned for its excellent range of independent retailers, offering unique and individual items you won't find everywhere else. The constantly-changing array of inspiring arts and crafts at Fisherton Mill, for example. Classic and contemporary menswear at Chas H Baker. Fine lingerie and swimwear at Annie's Just Jane. Head to Regent Tailoring for timeless design with British heritage at its core. Hayball Cyclesport for all things bike-related. Casa Fina for stylish home accessories and gifts. Or Roly's Fudge Pantry to sample the ultimate in tasty treats.

For hustle and bustle you can't beat a good market, and Salisbury has markets in abundance. Artisan, teenage and vintage markets. Farmers' and street food markets. Continental markets and the ever-popular Christmas Market, with its colourful stalls swathed in twinkling lights. Tuesdays* and Saturdays are particularly busy, thanks to the Charter Market which has been drawing people to the city for almost 800 years.

DAYS OUT FROM SALISBURY

Whether you have a day, a weekend or longer there is plenty to explore, with thousands of years of history within easy reach. Visit in 2019 to write your own chapter in Salisbury's never-ending story.

On the doorstep
Just 9 miles north of Salisbury lies the World Heritage Site of Stonehenge. If you stand on Salisbury Plain at sunrise or sunset it's easy to see why the ancient Britons believed this prehistoric monument was special. Its orientation on the rising and setting sun is one of its many unique features, but why it was built in this way has been lost in the mists of time. Go to visitwiltshire.co.uk/shop to pre-book your timed entry ticket. Thanks to its glorious location on the eastern edge of Cranborne Chase, Salisbury Racecourse is one of England's most beautiful. With racing having taken place here since the early 1600s, it's also one of the country's most historic. These days it offers 16 high quality flat race meetings between April and October.

Further afield
Within easy driving distance of Salisbury you'll also find Longleat, the UK's first drive-through safari park, and the stunning National Trust house and garden at Stourhead. Other places to visit nearby include Amesbury History Centre • Cholderton Rare Breeds Farm • Forest Falconry • Larmer Tree Gardens • Old Wardour Castle • Wilton House • and a range of properties in the care of The Churches Conservation Trust.

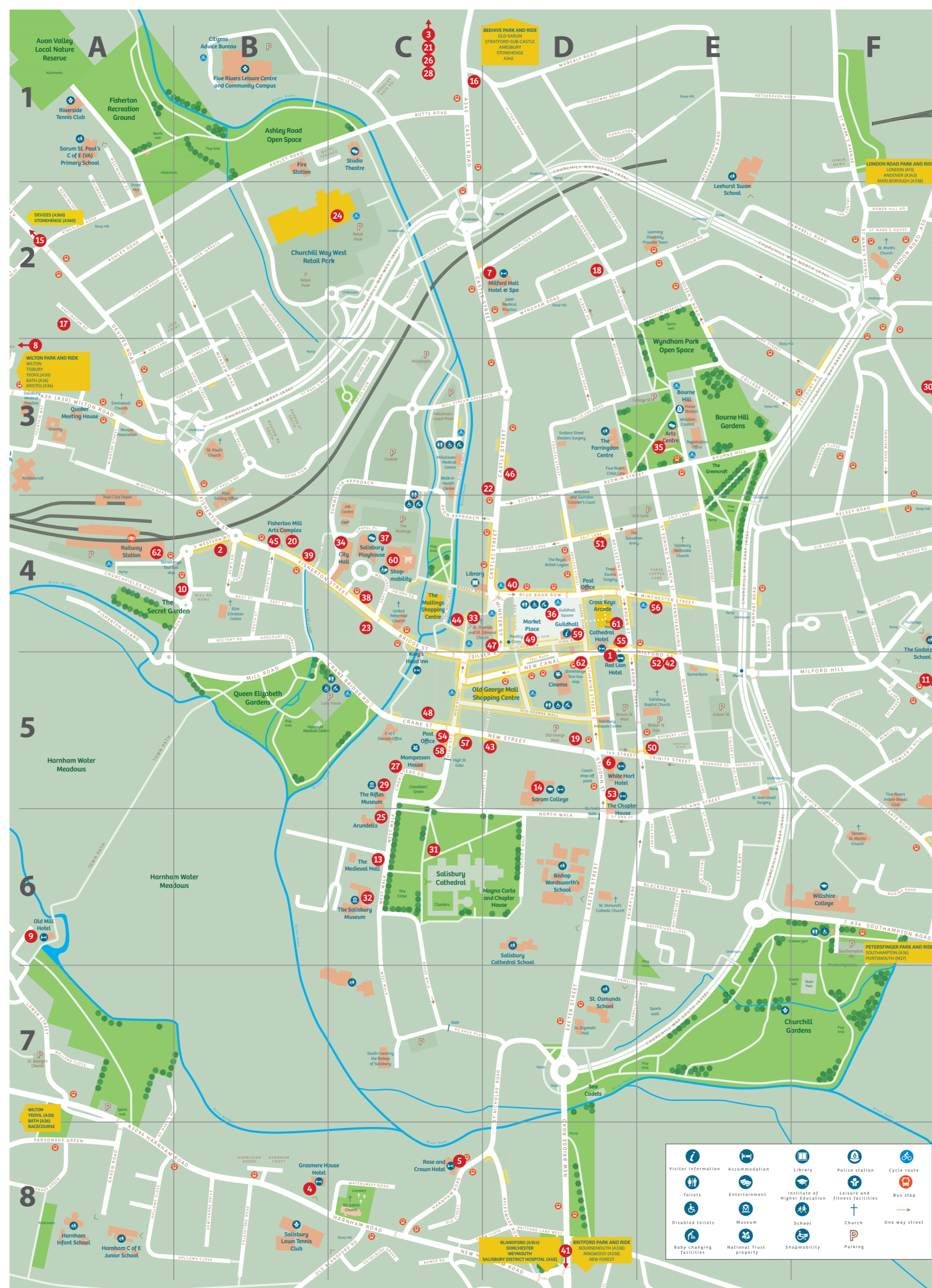

THERE'S MORE TO THIS CATHEDRAL THAN MEETS THE EYE

You may be surprised at just how much there is to see and do at Salisbury Cathedral – it is so much more than just a beautiful old building.

A must see is the original Magna Carta, the **best preserved** of only four 1215 documents that have survived to this day, set in an interactive exhibition explaining its significance. This parchment is one of the most celebrated documents in English history and is inscribed in the **UNESCO 'Memory of the World'** register because of its global importance.

For the adventurous, a tower tour is the **ultimate experience** taking you behind the scenes through hidden medieval roof spaces. Climb 332 steps in easy stages up to the base of the famous spire for **panoramic views** of the surrounding water meadows and city.

Children can follow a **fun family trail** or use an Explorer Pack filled with goodies to help them get the best experience from their visit. The surrounding close is **perfect for picnics** on a sunny day but there is also plenty of cover for those inevitable rainy days – you can even bring your dog when you visit!

The Cathedral is also home to contemporary artworks by **Elizabeth Frink, Barbara Hepworth, Lynn Chadwick, Emily Young and William Pye** and it hosts major art exhibitions throughout the year.

STEP OFF THE WORLD FOR A WHILE

In an area renowned for its outstanding chalk streams and rivers, Salisbury stands at the confluence of the Avon, Bourne, Ebble, Nadder and Wylye. Between them these waterways offer excellent fishing, scenic riverside walks, and the chance to spot an abundant variety of wildlife.

Surrounded by rolling chalk downs and lush green water-meadows, Salisbury is often referred to as the city in the countryside. But there are plenty of parks and green spaces within the city as well. Go for a romantic stroll. Enjoy a picnic. Or simply relax and watch the world go by.

outstanding views of the Cathedral. Follow the riverside walk north to Old Sarum. Or join long-distance routes such as the Clarendon Way and the Avon Valley Path. For organised walking tours and trails, contact specialists such as **Alison Howell's Foot Trails** and **Guided Walks in Wiltshire**.

To the west of Salisbury lies the rich, undulating landscape of **Cranborne Chase**, an **Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty**. Travel south from the city and you reach the glorious open heath and ancient woodland of the **New Forest National Park**. To the north, the vast expanse of **Salisbury Plain** is home to many rare and endangered species. While the many nature reserves in the care of Wiltshire Wildlife Trust, including **Langford Lakes**, offer numerous locations to enjoy the great outdoors.

With plentiful footpaths, miles of ancient drove roads and quiet country lanes, the Salisbury area offers exceptional opportunities for exploring under your own steam. For cyclists, The Golden Way is an easy circular route linking the Cathedral and Old Sarum.
